#### March 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2018 update: we are accepting orders for the Old Union Cemetery Book.

Hello to everyone who maintains an interest in Old Union Cemetery, Doctor's Fork Baptist Church, the Harmon Pipes Gray Family Association and the history of the pioneer, ancestral families who lived around the old church in the 19th Century.

At the 2016 Family Association Reunion we discussed ways to raise funds to support the ongoing maintenance of the grounds and the stone markers in the old cemetery. A suggestion was made that a book be produced that would document the history of the church, the ancestors buried there and provide an inventory of who is buried there and also the history of the Family Association.

So this update article is a preview of the contents of the book and hopefully it will encourage you to purchase a copy for yourself and to encourage others to purchase one as well. They will make great gifts and children and grandchildren will surely need copies too. Our only advertising and sales venue will be word of mouth, social media and email.

I may also be able to get an article in the Advocate Messenger about it. **But we will absolutely need your help in selling the books.** 

The book will be 186 pages and has about 250 pictures, maps, graphics and tables. I am going to front the cost of printing and shipping the books to my house and to you, the customer. My order to the printer will be for 50 books at a time and our goal is to sell 200 copies. All proceeds after paying the printing and shipping costs will go to the Harmon Pipes Gray Family Association. Orders for the book will be through me for now and it will not be for sale on Amazon or anywhere commercially. We may release it to commercial distribution after the 200 copies are sold but profit from commercial sales is very small.

The first 200 copies of the book will be a special numbered first edition signed by the author. I will be placing the first order for 50 copies next week and they should be here about the middle of March for shipping to you. I already have reservations (and some payments) for 30 of the first 50 copies. When those are sold, I will order 50 more.

The selling price of each book will be 40 dollars. It will be a full color, hardcover, case bound book. Half of the price will cover printing and shipping costs, the remaining half will go to the Family Association.

Please remember that the primary purpose of the book is to raise funds for the HPG Family Association. The secondary purpose is to preserve the history of the old church and cemetery and our ancestors.

The pages that follow are NEW <u>random pages</u> from the book and I will tell you that there are some surprises in it as well. One of the surprises is the paintings by RW Rawlings like the one on the next page. We found out about the paintings and received permission to use them in the book from Mr. Rawlings' son, who is a minister in Nicholasville and of course we have permission from the owners of the paintings. Pictures of the old church building and the cemetery have been very difficult to find but we do have a couple of them. We also have an excellent well researched article about the Civil War and its impact on the church and surrounding area by my son Jason Pipes. Also included are transcriptions of deeds, quotes, and wills etc., to document the early history of the Church.

What is in the book? The Table of Contents is on the next page.

This book will in time become a rarity and a collector's item. Please spread the word and encourage others to purchase a copy. 200 copies does not sound like very many but it will take considerable effort to achieve that.

The return to the Family Association will be several thousand dollars. (You can do the math, this article is like a word problem from math class.) I will be sharing a financial statement with the HPG Family Association Officers and will gladly share it with anyone interested.





#### The Church History

Although the Copeland property passed on to several others over the years, there were always included in the deeds a set aside for the church property. As we will see later, the property changed hands several times.

It is very interesting to see that the deed provides proof that the road used to run south of the cemetery and was called Knob Road and that the road from Perryville to Lebanon was called the Green River Road. They were only 264 feet apart at that point. (A larger copy of the graphic above is in the appendix.)

[The original Prebyterian group and the building were named "Union" and the building became 'Union Meeting House' in references made of it. The original building was quite basic and small and built as an ancient stiled structure. It has to be important to mention that the word "old" has become permanently attached to the word "Union" in our subject church and to this day the cemetery is referred to as Old Union Cemetery. The word 'old' is not a reference to its age but refers to a split among the faithful of the Presbyterian Church in the early 1800s over an article of faith named predestination and others. Presbyterianism is based on the writings and beliefs of Englishman John Calvin who maintained that predestination was a factual part of faith. The congregants did not all follow or accept that concept. The persons who did not believe left the church and formed the Cumberland sect of the faith and those that remained were then labeled as "old" Presbyterians, who followed the original "old" Calvinist teachings. James Copeland and his son John Copeland were said to be "old" Presbyterians and so the word 'old' has remained with the name 'Union'.]

#### THE BAPTISTS ARE INVITED TO SHARE THE UNION MEETING HOUSE.

The Presbyterian congregation at Union, in July of 1805 invited the Doctor's Fork Baptist Congregation to share the Union Meeting House with them, and the Baptists, after consideration, agreed to use the building "one day". (The term 'one day' is used in the history of the Baptist congregation and I suppose that meant one day per month.)

#### The Church History



The Sons of the American Revolution, Lexington, honored the memory of Capt. John Pipes, Revolutionary War Soldier, at ceremonies at Old Union Cemetery in Boyle County last Sunday [August of 1961]. Shown in the picture at the exercises, which were held after a reunion of the Pipes, Gray, and Harmon Families, are from the left; Mrs. Walter Harmon and Levi A. Harmon, both of Perryville; Mrs. J[ames]. E. Pipes, Dayton, Ohio; and Charles B. Pipes and his son, William B., both of Lexington.

#### Marker Placed at Grave of Revolutionary War Soldier

[Transcribed from an article in the Danville Advocate Messenger]

The Lafayette Chapter of the Kentucky Society of Sons of the American Revolution placed an official marker at the grave of Revolutionary War Soldier, Capt. John Pipes, on Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Capt. Pipes is buried in Old Union Cemetery near Gravel Switch, in Boyle County, Kentucky and served in the Army with George Washington. Following the reunion of the three local families of Capt. John Pipes, John Gray and Michael Harmon at Perryville Battlefield State Park, the marker placing ceremonies took place. Robert Featherstone of the Lexington chapter of S. A. R. opened the program by placing the American Flag of the original arrow shaped headstone of Captain Pipes. Mr. Featherstone then introduced compatriot W. A. Wentworth of the S. A. R. and also president of the Kentucky Historical Society, who made the presentation of the marker.

#### George Washington Pipes and Mariah M. Edwards

George was a grandson of John Pipes Jr. and John Gray, Mariah was a descendant of the Whitehouse, Edwards and Sparrow Families. The had seven children. George and Mariah owned the original Pipes property after his parents passed and had their own home just east of the cemetery. It still stands there.



#### Reunion Held Want Cemetery to Be Historic Site

Members of the Harmon-Pipes-Gray Family Association Inc., who attended the annual family reunion at Doctor's Fork Baptist Church Aug. 8, heard about plans and hopes for making the Old Union Cemetery on U.S. Route 68 (Lebanon Rd.), southwest of Perryville, a historic site.

Cecil L. Pipes of Piqua, Ohio, newly-elected president of the association, is a prime mover in the plan to have the cemetery, which is not in good condition, renovated and then hopefully designated as a historic site. Other officers elected Aug. 8 at the reunion, attended by approximately 50 persons, were J.O. Tucker of Perryville, vice president; Mrs. Elizabeth H. Tucker, Perryville, secretary; Nelson Powell, Parksville, treasurer; Miss Ethel McGraw, Perryville, recorder and William Harmon of Bellevue, Charles Pipes of Lexington, Allen Powell of Danville and James W. Cox of Louisville, trustees.

One of the first steps to be taken in plans for improving the cemetery is to have Miss McGraw, librarian at Boyle Elementary School and recorder for the family association, make a plat of the cemetery and list the names and location of all persons buried there. Among the graves is that of Capt. John Pipes, a Revolutionary soldier.

It also is planned, Cecil L. Pipes said, to have the tombstones straightened and repaired, remove the old church and have the area fenced. Improvements to the road to the cemetery already have been requested and money is being raised for the restoration.

Mr. Pipes said The Old Bank of Perryville is acting as depository for funds for the cemetery and several persons have donated already or are providing bequests in their wills to help maintain the cemetery. Once the cemetery is designated as a national shrine, it is anticipated that other organizations will assist in putting in walkways and shrubbery.

#### VISIT CEMETERY


